Dear Praying Friends,

According to the dictionary, "crisis" means a time of intense difficulty, trouble, or danger. We have seen many "crises" in the ministry lately.

Spiritual Crises: In our ministry in McAllen, the devil has been working overtime - since we moved into our own property and saw how encouraged the people were. Since March, we have seen several people become very discouraged in the work. One couple left in March, another very active man quit serving all together. Several others are discouraged too. As we write this letter, we are preparing to go assist the Hispanic department of a supporting church for 3 weeks due to the loss of their pastor. Crises all around! Please, pray for revival!

Home Crises: Seven of our most faithful families are having problems in their homes. Some are having problems with their children, others have serious problems between husband and wife, and then there are others battling with their parents. Please pray for our families! (We know that this is part of the spiritual crisis mentioned above).

Health Crises: Amidst all the other crises, Michelle and I have had a really trying first half of the year health wise. Counting hospitalizations, seizures, and other illnesses - Michelle has been sick for over 50 days. With my surgeries and illness, I have been sick 30! We have really struggled lately. Please pray for our health!

Vacation Bible School Crises: We had our annual VBS in July with many workers getting sick! I was sick for 4 days, Michelle for 3 days, and Melissa Houston for 2 days. Several other workers also got sick! Had it not been for the group from Worth Baptist Church that came down to help us, it would have been even more chaotic!

Paul said in II Tim. 2:9, "Wherein I suffer trouble ... even unto bonds; but the word of God is not bound."



Despite all our crises, the Word is not in crisis. Since our last letter, 5 were saved on visitation, the church is averaging over 90, we averaged over 100 in VBS, and raised \$500 in VBS for our Mexican missionary in Burkina Fasso, Africa. On top of all of that, the Bible Institute started classes in September!

Please pray that God will give us grace in all of these crises that we might glorify His name in all we do, and hat more souls will be saved. Thank you for holding the ropes of prayer for us! We need you now more than

THE FUNDAMENTAL BAPTIST **CONFESSION OF FAITH**

(Article Two in a Series)

We Independent Baptists are different, distinct, and disconnected from any ecclesiastical hierarchy. We believe in the autonomy of the

local church and the priesthood of the believer. We refuse to compromise our convictions or lower our standards

We must never forget who we are, from where we came, and what we believe. We entertain no new revelations. If it is not in the **BOOK**, we have no part or parcel of it.

I call to the witness stand a well-known exponent of the truth, JUDE, who wrote the book that bears his name. He identified himself as "the servant of Jesus Christ and brother of James" (Vs. 1).

Jude wrote his epistle around 66 A.D., the theme of which is "Contending for the Faith." Read what he wrote in verse 3: "Beloved, when I give all diligence to write unto you of the common salvation, it was needful for me to write unto you, and exhort you that you should earnestly contend for the faith that was once delivered unto the saints."

Why did Jude think it was necessary for him to exhort his readers to *"earnestly contend for the faith (body of revealed truth)* which was once (once for all) delivered unto the saints?" It was needful because the apostasy of the professing church had already lifted its ugly head

To say that the Bible is pure means that it is free from impurities and imperfections. The Bible does not contradict itself. It contradicts those who read it with preconceived ideas about its inerrancy.

Sir Walter Scott, a great English poet and statesman, wrote:

"Within this ample volume" Lies the mystery of mysteries. Happiest they of human race, To whom their God hath given grace To read, to fear, to hope, to pray, *To lift the latch, to force the way.* But better had they ne'er been born, Who read to doubt, or read to scorn."

The recent October semi-annual offering, exceeded our goal of \$40,000.00! (which along with the May offering, makes up the funds needed for one-third of the operating expense of the seminary). What a blessing Pastor Jerry Siler and the Cornerstone Baptist Temple of Dayton, Ohio, were as hosts of the semi-annual fellowship, to the many preachers in attendance by way of decorations, special music, food, friendliness, and attendance turnout each night.

In a third sense, the seminary has also enjoyed being wrapped up in the surroundings, accommodations and caretaking of Worth Baptist Church. The staff of the Church has made us feel at home. From Tuesday through Friday, we make use of up to five Sunday School classrooms, two offices, the chapel area of the Spanish ministry, and at times the Fellowship Hall.

In the new year we will see **new students** joining us in January, several new graduates, and our new 26,000 sq. ft. facility taking shape before our eyes, just 1.5 miles west on White Settlement Road from our old location, then 1.5 miles south on Chapel Creek Boulevard (hence located just one half of a mile north of I-30). We will also see new churches getting started or revitalized by NBBS graduates or students; and new missionaries on deputation, or headed to their foreign field of service!
