On June 7, 2020, my mentor and hero, Dr. Harold Noble, went home to be with his Lord. The virus took his earthly life and he was ushered into the heavenly. Bro. Harold was the first Navajo ordained Independent Baptist



preacher. He pioneered planting churches and was obsessed with getting his people the good news of Jesus Christ. Humanly speaking, were it not for Bro. Noble, I would never have gotten to the Reservation. He took me under wing and taught me the Rez. He and his wife, Annie (who went home in July of 2019), loved Tricia and me and our children. After six months of being with him at the church in Steamboat, he encouraged me to go to Tsaile with Raymond Hobbs and start a work. The rest is history. The



work in Tsaile-Lukachukai remains and others have been planted. I was asked by his family to come by and see if any books in his library would help our college students. They also gave me his cowboy hat. I will miss going by his house for counsel and just to talk about the Lord and the future of the Gospel on Navajo. He was an older preacher who gave me the help I needed and the counsel necessary to reach the Rez. Guess I'm becoming one of the old ones now. I only hope and pray I can mentor and help others the way Bro. Harold did me. Truly, there is a "Hello after Goodbye." Thank you, Lord, for using Harold Noble in my life. Let him know that we will carry on the work and see him soon. Dr. and Mrs. Mark Haynes
